This year's competition revolves around the theme of "Climate Change and Its Impact on Trade and Refugee Protection." It presents the challenges faced by developing countries, particularly Anamia, in dealing with the devastating consequences of climate change, including agricultural crises, displacement of populations, and social upheaval. The problem also explores the differing immigration policies of Anamia and Ranania regarding Polomian climate refugees and their compliance with emigration and refugee laws. Additionally, it addresses the introduction of Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanisms (CBAMs) by Ranania and their potential impact on trade, non-discrimination, and fair practices. The moot problem highlights the urgency of finding sustainable solutions, promoting international cooperation, and protecting the rights and well-being of climate refugees.

It provides a unique opportunity for participants to analyze the legal and policy dimensions of climate change, trade, and refugee protection, with implications for global climate action and equitable international relations.

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
